## Challenging Behaviour in Patients with Dementia in Acute Hospitals

Gregory Swanwick MD, FRCPI, MRCPsych, qualified from Trinity College Dublin in 1986. Before entering the Dublin University psychiatric training program, he worked in general medicine in Ireland and New Zealand. He obtained membership of the Royal College of Physicians in Ireland, 1990, and the Royal College of Psychiatrists, 1992. He was awarded the Woodford-Williams Prize by the Royal College of Psychiatrists in 1994 for original work relating to the prevention of dementia

and this work led to an MD from TCD in 1995. Currently, he is a consultant psychiatrist in psychiatry of old age with the HSE and Adelaide and Meath Hospital, Dublin and the co-ordinator of postgraduate medical education at the hospital. He is also a Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Dublin, Trinity College and is the Director of Postgraduate Training and Education with the College of Psychiatry of Ireland.

Thomas Walsh is a graduate of NUI, Cork.
